Assignment Sheet 2—Evaluate Disaster Types for Possible Occurrence at Family Farm and Develop an Emergency Preparedness Plan for Each Type of Disaster

The United States is prone to many different types of disasters. Some of our known disasters are more prone to occur in the different geographic regions of the United States. Type of disaster: Fire

Preventing barn fires and being prepared in the event of a fire can mean the difference between life and death of your goats. Knowledge of the danger of fires and how to deal with them is of the greatest importance and should be an ongoing concern to goat producers.
